# LETTER FROM BOARD CHAIR AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

# 2020 was a challenging year worldwide, with the impact of COVID-19 felt across the global health and development community and especially in the

**communities we serve.** Despite these challenges, CORE Group pivoted to new and improved ways of engaging and serving its networks. With your support, we expanded our membership in 2020 to include international organizations and students, and welcomed a 22% increase in new members from 2019. Our membership grew to include more than 188 nongovernmental organizations, students, advocates, academia, and private sector professionals working together to advance community health.

In 2020, CORE Group undertook a number of COVID-19-related initiatives to respond to the needs of its members and the global health and development community. We launched the COVID-19 Global Response Coordination series with weekly webinars to address the most pressing information, advocacy, and implementation needs of our partners. These included topics such as digital health platforms, gender issues, ongoing immunization needs, children and youth, COVID-19 in conflict settings, and a special focus on Latin America with a session conducted in Spanish. We also launched the COVID-19 Digital Classroom, a partnership among the Community Health Academy at Last Mile Health, CORE Group, Medical Aid Films, TechChange, Translators without Borders, and UNICEF that provides high-quality, medically reviewed multimedia content and a training course for community-based health workers and local communities. Globally, more than 1,221 learners enrolled

from 78 countries. CORE Group also organized a C19 Virtual Marketplace to connect suppliers and end-users in real time to provide direct access to information, supplies, and other resources to address the urgent healthcare demands during COVID-19. To date, the value of commodities posted on the platform tops \$410 million with more than \$133 million in commodities and informational offerings claimed by organizations in need. In addition, CORE Group convened 15 member organizations to create the Home-Based Care Task Force. The members of this task force developed a Home-Based Care Reference Guide for COVID-19, which is available as a free resource in several languages on the CORE Group website.

CORE Group cosponsored two global virtual summits with <u>PMNCH</u> (formerly the Partnership for Maternal, Newborn and Child Health) in 2020, centering the theme of <u>Lives in the Balance</u> in support of women, children, and adolescents' health during the COVID-19 pandemic. These offerings expanded the global and country-level reach of our consortium to benefit members' access to information and advocacy platforms. More than 3,000 participants from 92 countries livestreamed the July event, the largest such gathering in CORE Group's history.

Our volunteer-led Working Groups and Interest Groups form the backbone of CORE Group, and they continue to generously lend their time and expertise to advance high-quality technical work and learning events. In 2020, the Working Groups organized 14 knowledge sharing events that reached more than 2,500 individuals worldwide. We remain so grateful to the CORE Group Working Group Co-Chairs and members! This year CORE Group placed a special emphasis on supporting women of color by instituting a special internship program that was launched in December. Providing opportunities to highlight the skills and contributions of women within our membership and our community partnerships worldwide is an established commitment of the CORE Group team.

CORE Group maintains our commitment to racial justice and diversity, equity, and inclusion, and led internal and external events in 2020 on these cross-cutting topics. We also planned workshops for early 2021 with Bridge People consulting group and CORE Group members.

Our Board of Directors play a critical role in the successes and new directions of the CORE Group. This year, we welcomed four new members of the Board, expanding our commitment to representation that is gender balanced and illustrative of our broad global reach: **Ahmed Arale**, CORE Group Polio Project, Kenya and Somalia; **Dr. Nabeel Akram**, Faculty Department of International Health, Johns Hopkins International Injury Research Unit; **Caroline Quijada**, ABT Associates; and **Alka Ahuja**, Malaria Consortium UK.

CORE Group's commitment around the world to community health and collaboration is strong, and we continue to advance our collective voice in community health to reach the populations who are underserved. We are grateful to all our members and partners for their support and engagement. Through the guidance and leadership of our Board of Directors, as well as the amazing CORE Group staff, we have achieved outstanding results together in 2020. In 2021, we look forward to deepening our engagement with CORE Group members, Working Group Co-Chairs, partners, donors, and youth to meet their needs for global health learning and collaboration. We are grateful for the support of the CORE Group community!


# Lives in the Balance COVID-19 Summits

CORE Group cosponsored two virtual Lives in the Balance summits with PMNCH in 2020. The first convening was Lives in the Balance: A COVID-19 Summit for Women, Children, and Adolescents, which was held online from July 1 to 2, 2020. This was the first major global summit on COVID-19 in 2020 with the aim of reflecting on the global response to COVID-19, sharing best practices for pandemic response, and fostering collaboration to forge a path forward using innovative approaches. Following the success of the first summit on COVID-19, CORE Group, PMNCH, and UHC2030 reconvened with partners across the globe for a second virtual summit in December. The second Lives in the Balance summit took stock of COVID-19's impact on progress toward achieving universal health coverage (UHC). This programming bolstered global messaging of CORE Group Working Groups and members. More than 3,000 attendees participated in the July event.


# **COVID-19 Response Coordination**

We provided rapid response and coordination to support CORE Group members' response to the COVID-19 pandemic in the form of weekly webinars, which began in February 2020 when CORE Group launched a series of weekly COVID-19 Global Pandemic Response Coordination calls. These online sessions addressed the most urgent needs of our global partners, including information for advocacy and implementation. Sessions highlighted digital health platforms, gender issues, ongoing immunization needs, special considerations for children and youth, COVID-19 in conflict settings, and the situation in Latin America. CORE Group conducted 15 webinars in 2020, with a total of more than

2,000 participants from across six continents. To maximize reach, the sessions were also live-streamed on Facebook, where they received an additional 1,500 views. Recordings and presentations are available on the CORE Group website.

# Gavi Civil Society Organisation Steering Committee

CORE Group Executive Director Lisa Hilmi provided strategic global thought leadership as part of Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance's CSO Steering Committee. The Gavi CSO Constituency and Steering Committee work to advance Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance's vision of a world where all children are reached with life-saving vaccines. 2020 was particularly busy due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the creation of the COVAX Facility, and the multiple stakeholders involved in the collaboration of the COVID-19 response.

# **COVAX Facility**

As part of CORE Group Executive Director Lisa Hilmi's role on the GAVI Civil Society Organization (CSO) Steering Committee, she co-chaired CSO engagement with COVAX agency leads and the ACT-A CSO Engagement Platform. This effort prioritized advocacy for COVID-19 vaccine equity and access for community health facilities in low- and middle-income countries.

# **PMNCH**

PMNCH (formerly the Partnership for Maternal, Newborn and Child Health) is the world's largest alliance for women, children, and adolescents' health (WCAH). CORE Group Executive Director Lisa Hilmi, who is the NGO Constituency Chair on the Board of PMNCH, worked with the PMNCH Board and NGO Constituency to help roll out the new PMNCH Strategy and organize multiple advocacy-related events throughout the year. Ensuring CORE Group members have access to PMNCH activities, tools, and advocacy opportunities is a priority!

Medicines for Humanity (MFH) works with healthcare partners, particularly Catholic sisters, in developing countries to provide Integrated Management of Childhood Illness at the community and clinic level.



# YOUNG PROFESSIONALS NETWORK



CORE Group's Young Professionals Network (YPN) formally engages and supports future innovators of global community health and international development. The network fosters engagement, collaboration, knowledge sharing, and career development among our young CORE Group members.

# **Mentorship Program**

By pairing mentors and mentees, we hope to deepen the collaboration, engagement, and learning among our diverse community.

In 2020, 10 mentor-mentee pairs of varying professional levels and backgrounds participated in the program, each creating a flexible workplan with activities such as résumé review, guidance on advanced studies, and resource sharing.


In 2019, CORE Group hosted the first Pitch Challenge at our Regional Global Health Practitioner Conference in Nairobi, Kenya. The Pitch Challenge was established to foster innovation at the community level to create solutions to a pressing community health issue. The winner and runner-up of the Challenge, teams from Rwanda and Kenya respectively, are using social and behavior change to shift their communities' beliefs, norms, and practices regarding critical health issues. They teamed up with volunteer mentors from CORE Group's International Community Health Network to grow their ideas and implement their project plans on a one-year project life cycle through 2020.

#### Winner

The Devie Team aimed to maximize youth involvement through innovative and youth relevant comprehensive sexual education (CSE) with regard to the reduction of adolescent pregnancy in Rwanda. Devie Team received one year of mentorship from Allison Yoos of IMPACT Kenya and Joseph Petraglia of Syntegral.
