Significant percentage point increases in skilled birth attendant deliveries in three Northern states. Volunteers use narrated mimes and Say & Do activities to convey decision-making information to groups, get people talking about healthier behaviours and generate social approval for change. Developed polio transmission mimes, the Vaccination Hand, the Emergency Maternal Care Danger Signs and the Safe Pregnancy Plan as communication tools used successfully by the CE volunteers; facilitated the MNCH Materials Development Workshop that enabled stakeholders to develop participatory tools for Birth Spacing, Skilled Birth Attendants and Safe Delivery, and Newborn Danger Signs and Care.

The rapid pre- and post-session questionnaires demonstrated that the sessions increased participant knowledge on key polio and RI decision-making to ≥90% from an average of 33% and 9% respectively.
