Hesperian books have been translated into over 80 languages, and are used in 222 countries and territories.





















Care Just After Birth

In the first hour after birth, you can help the survival and long-term health of a baby:


- Make sure she is breathing well.
- 2. Keep her warm and dry, skin-to-skin with her mother.
- 3. Help her start breastfeeding.

Is the baby breathing well?

As the baby is being born, and as you are drying her and putting her to her mother's breast, check to see if she is breathing well. When you act quickly, you can usually save a baby who is not breathing.




This baby looks healthy.

This baby needs help fast.

If the baby is limp, blue, or not breathing Do not hit the baby.


 Clear mucus from the baby's mouth by gently wiping it with your finger wrapped in a clean piece of cloth. Or use a bulb syringe or suction trap to get the mucus out of the mouth, then the nose.









Use images to convey content

Images can:

- Make information accessible, represent complex ideas visually
- Illustrate processes, steps, materials, positions of the body, etc.
- Draw attention to key information
- Break up the space on the page
- Warm up the text






Use images to draw people in


Images can:


- Make it easier for people to relate to the information, feel that it reflects their own experiences
- Highlight feelings about a topic, provide humor where needed
- Enable a different, more personal voice than the one used in the text
- Create a sense of dialogue with the reader





Technical drawings






Sequence drawings

Step 1:

Position the arm in its natural, resting position. The elbow should be bent.




Step 2:

Wrap a layer of bandage, gauze, or thin cloth or use the sleeve.



Step 3:


Rest the arm on the splint. For legs, splint along the side.




Step 4:

Wrap around the splint with a bandage or strip of fabric to hold it in place.








Tips to illustrate content with Hesperian Images

- 1 or 2 images per page. Think of spreads.
- What content can be made into an image?
 - Technical
 - Main idea or theoretical ideas
 - Interaction
- Are there any opportunities to incorporate:
 - Context and cultural awareness
 - Gender equality
 - Power dynamics



Technical images

Show step by step.

- In the book it appears as a sequence
- In Hesperian Images they appear as separate images tagged with similar words.








Show as much of the person as is possible, instead of disembodied body parts.




1. Replace lengthy text and make content more appealing.

Child Labor

Many children go to work full time before they are 18 years old. In many places, it is legal for children as young as 14 to work in the factories. Even if it is not legal, many children work to help support their families.

The children most harmed by factory work are children younger than the legal working age who are working instead of going to school. Child labor harms children's development. It also denies children the opportunity to learn to read, write, or do math. Children who do not get an education have fewer work opportunities than adults.
